



Alaska CNA Certification Checklist

Complete training through one of the following options:

- Approved CNA program with at least 140 hours of training, including at least 60 hours of classroom training and 80 hours of labs/clinical practice
- Equivalent nursing education of at least one year that included classroom and clinical training within the last 2 years
- Military training and service as a U.S. corpsman or medic within the past 5 years
- Nursing training program in a foreign country
- Possess a current or lapsed unencumbered registered nursing license

Pass the following:

- NNAAP exam administered by Credentia

Submit the following:

- Fingerprints for criminal background checks through the Department of Public Safety and the FBI
- Fully executed Alaska's Nurse Aide Certification by Examination application

If behind on child support payments per the Alaska Child Support Enforcement Division, you receive a nonrenewable 150-day temporary CNA license to use while resolving payment issues.
